



## IPC Bulletin for Care Home staff Issue No. 19 — November 2019

To support Care Home staff, here is some information on good infection prevention and control (IPC) practice.

# Viral gastroenteritis/Norovirus is on the increase

### **Prevent and protect**

#### Help prevent transmission:

- Wash your hands with liquid soap and warm running water and dry with paper towels:
  - After using the toilet
  - After assisting residents with personal care
  - Before preparing, handling, serving and eating food and beverages



- Before work, staff breaks and lunch and before you go home
- Encourage residents to wash their hands or help them use moist non-alcohol hand wipes before eating or drinking
- Do not use alcohol handrub as it is not effective at killing the virus
- Manage episodes of diarrhoea and vomit promptly, wearing disposable gloves and apron
- Following an episode of diarrhoea and vomiting, clean and disinfect the environment, including commonly touched surfaces, with a chlorine-based product, e.g. Milton. Make a fresh solution every 24 hours
- Isolate symptomatic residents where possible until symptom free for 48 hours
- Advise visitors not to visit unless they are symptom free for 48 hours. Encourage visitors to wash their hands on entering and leaving the Care Home
- If a resident requires hospital admission, whether they are symptomatic or not, the receiving ward/hospital should be informed if the Care Home is closed due to diarrhoea and vomiting

#### **Remember:**

Alcohol handrub is **not** effective at killing the virus causing diarrhoea and vomiting, therefore, hands should be washed with liquid soap and warm running water
